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# The How Patterdale Cottage

## **SAFETY INFORMATION**

We don't want to bombard you with "do's and don'ts" but the following information is important. Most of it is common sense, but it aims to ensure that your stay at The How is as safe as possible. Please take the time to read this – and ensure that everyone knows what to do in the event of a fire.

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### ***In the event of a fire***

- **Leave the cottage immediately.** We suggest you leave the house keys in the back door overnight so you know where they are!
- If you have a mobile phone, ring 999 and ask for the fire service. The nearest phone box is by the White Lion Pub. There is a local fire service and they will arrive as soon as possible.
- Whilst we have a fire blanket and fire extinguisher in the kitchen (in the thin wall cupboard with no handle) and in the hall way by the back door these should not be used to tackle anything but the most minor incidents.

### • **Escape Routes**

The best exit is of course through the back door. In the unlikely event that you cannot get access to the front door, the patio doors in the living room and the bedroom window in the main bedroom could be used as an escape route. Lower yourself out of the window feet first.

- Assemble in front of the cottage and ensure that everyone has evacuated the cottage.
- At an appropriate time, please ring us on 017684 82474.

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## *General safety*

- General cleaning equipment is stored in the cupboard under the kitchen sink. Other general equipment is stored in the outside utility room. Please ensure that babies and young children do not have access to these.
- The patios and path outside can be VERY slippery, even when it is not raining. Please take care when walking on them and supervise young children. Please ensure that young children and babies are supervised at all times.
- A wood burning stove is attractive, but please treat it with respect. Do not allow children to play with the fire. **PLEASE DO NOT LEAVE THE FIRE UNATTENDED.**
- Always close the door of the stove and do not remove the rug from in front of the fire.
- Do not “overload” the fire, and please be careful when opening the door as it can become hot. Please only burn wood and paper – no plastic or other materials.
- There is one mains wired smoke and heat alarm at the cottage – in the hall way. Please ensure the bathroom door is closed when showering, and the kitchen window is open when cooking to avoid unnecessary alarms!
- Please note we are not on the mains sewer. Please therefore do not put anything other than toilet paper down the loo!
- The cottage does not have an in-house telephone, but there is reception for Vodafone. If you have a Vodafone, please keep it in your bedroom overnight in case you need to contact the emergency services. The nearest phone box is next to the White Lion Pub if needed.

### General

#### Breakages

Accidents do happen! If you break or damage anything, please let us know as soon as possible so that we can put it right.

#### Parking

Parking for the cottage is on the driveway. Please close the gates to the drive when you leave to stop the sheep wandering in and eating all the flowers!

#### No Smoking

We would appreciate it if you would not smoke in the cottage – thank you!

#### Weather

There is a local weather service, which gives a local forecast and includes information on snow and ice conditions in the winter. The telephone number is 08700 550575.

#### Departure

Please leave the cottage by 09:30 and as you found it - clean and tidy!! Please ensure all lights are switched off and all the windows are closed. Please drop the keys off with us at Barco House. In the unlikely event that we are not around please pop them through the letterbox in the back door.

## The Lounge

### Books, Games and TV

We hope the lounge contains everything you need to while away the evenings. There is a selection of board games and DVD's for you to use as well as maps and guides to the area to help you plan your stay. Please feel free to borrow the maps /guides but do remember to return them for the use of future guests!!

Although we have "gone digital" the television reception can still be quite poor, especially for BBC1 and BBC2. We have freeview channels and the instruction manual for the DVD is in the kitchen sink drawer.

The Patio door key is on a hook to the right of the Patio doors. You need to flip the lever up once you have turned the key and down again before locking it.

### Heating

The cottage has electric heaters in all the rooms. They are not set to come on at particular times, therefore please alter them to suit your individual requirements. They are easy to operate. Please press the middle button to turn them "On" where "Ronit Digital Systems" will come up and the current temperature a few seconds later. To increase the temperature press the + button (to the right of the centre button) and to decrease the temperature press the minus button (to the left of the centre button). The heater will heat the room up to the required temperature. To turn the heaters off - press the middle button and the heaters will return to "Standby".

As they are electrical heaters **DO NOT PLACE ANYTHING DIRECTLY ON THEM - THIS IS A FIRE HAZARD**. Please use the ailer/"clothes horse" provided which can be found in the outside utility room.

In the bathroom there is a heated towel rail which comes on automatically.

The bungalow is fully double glazed and well insulated and so we hope you will be very warm. The wood burning stove will also provide a great deal of heat!

### Hot Water

Hot water is heated on a timed setting. For a daytime boost please press the boost button on the control panel located on the left hand side of the airing cupboard.

### Shower

The shower provides instant hot water. Please pull the switch at the side of the bath and switch it off again after your shower. Power and temperature controls are located on the shower unit.

### Wood Burning Stove

With the insulation and heaters the main benefits of the stove are therapeutic and decorative rather than essentially warming! We have provided enough logs, kindle and firelighters/matches for the wood burner to keep you going for the start of your stay. The firelighters and matches are stored under the sink in the kitchen.

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If you require any more logs during the course of your stay they can be purchased from R&R Corner Shop in Glenridding. To light the fire, place lightly screwed up newspaper in the wood burner and lay sticks and one piece of firelighter on top. Add a couple of logs on top of that and then light the firelighter. Remember to close the stove door when the fire is lit. You can adjust the airflow to the stove by using the controls at the top and bottom. Be aware the stove can get very hot during operation so care should be taken. If you are not used to using woodburners we recommend reading the instructions located in the kitchen sink cupboard.

Please remember to empty the grate daily. Please sweep the cold ash into newspaper and place in the dustbin outside.

## Outside Lights

As you can imagine it gets very dark outside the cottage at night, so if you are heading out for the evening we strongly suggest you a) take a torch and b) switch on the outside lights. The switch by the back door controls the outside lights – with the one nearest the door controlling the light by the patio doors and the middle switch controlling the light outside the back door. Please remember to switch these off again when you return!

## The Kitchen & Utility Room

### Making a brew

The water in the cottage is safe to drink but we suggest emptying the kettle and filling with fresh water in between cuppas! Mugs can be found in the cupboard above the microwave, and there should be plenty of tea and coffee in the wooden caddy.

### Utensils & Cupboards

Hopefully the kitchen should contain everything you need for your stay, and nothing should be too hard to find (it's not that big after all!). In a nutshell the main items are located as follows:

- Main cutlery - draw is to the left of the sink
- Plates/Bowls – cupboard above the microwave
- Pans - cupboard to the left of the sink
- Colander/Grater/baking trays – cupboard to the left of the sink
- Glasses and other items – cupboard above the microwave
- Place mats and coasters – on top of the microwave
- Instructions manuals – kitchen sink drawer
- Cleaning materials etc – Cupboard under the sink
- Iron and ironing board in the utility room
- Fuse board – in the unlikely event you need it is in the cupboard above the back door

### Cooker and Hob

The cooker and hob are easy to use. The manuals are in the kitchen sink drawer. Likewise instructions for the microwave should be in the drawer as well. No metal or foil in the microwave please!

## **Dishwasher**

The dishwasher is located to the right of the sink. Please be gentle when opening and closing it! Please do not put anything wooden into the dishwasher and do not overload it. We would kindly ask that you empty the dishwasher before you leave!

## **Kitchen Fridge**

Should be fairly self-explanatory but if not the manual is in the kitchen sink drawer. There is an additional fridge freezer in the outside utility room.

## **Washing Machine (in outside shed)**

The instructions for using the washing machine are in the kitchen sink drawer. Please do not overload the machine and use only non-bio washing powder so as not to offend out septic tank bugs! There is a clothes airer to the left of the washing machine. Please remember to turn the water supply on and off before and after use.

## **The Bathroom**

### **The Shower**

The shower provides instant hot water. Please pull the switch at the side of the bath and switch if off again after your shower. Power and temperature controls are located on the shower unit.

### **Cleaning the bath**

Please only use CIF cream for cleaning the bath as she is an old enamel and tin lady that doesn't respond well to bleach and other new cleaning products

### **Septic Tank**

We have a septic tank so please only put loo paper and the obvious down the toilet. All other material should be bagged and placed in the bin provided!

### **Towel Rail**

The towel rail behind the door comes on twice a day and should be sufficient to dry your towels.

## **The Bedrooms**

All fairly straightforward – there is ample hanging space in both bedrooms.

## **Outside**

The key for the outside utility room is the round yale key on the keyring. The utility room is the right hand outside shed.

The cushions for the outside metal chairs are located in this shed. Please ensure that they are returned there at the end of each day.

## Rubbish & Recycling

The dustbin is located outside the bungalow and there is a small bin under the sink in the kitchen.

There is a recycling centre for glass, newspapers, cans and tins in the main village car park in Glenridding – and the proceeds go to our village, so please use it. There is also a fortnightly collection of paper, bottles and cans by the council. Please place these items in the green recycling bin at the back of the cottage.

## Local Information

### Tourist Information Centre

Glenridding Information Centre is located in the main village car park and has comprehensive information about the local area (where to go, what to do, public transport, etc) as well local maps and guides. There are also guided walks from the Information Centre, led by National Park Voluntary Wardens. See the Events Guide for further information.

The Information Centre is open 9.30 am to 5.30 pm, 7 days a week from Easter to the end of October. In the winter, it opens from 9.30 am to 3.30 pm. The telephone number is 017684 82414.

## Local Shopping

### Patterdale

*Crookabeck Farm Shop* in Patterdale sells excellent locally produced Angora Goat Mohair and Herdwick wool socks, gloves, scarves knit kits, and even dog leads! The farm is over Goldrill Bridge, follow the lane to Rookings and turn right. You can visit the farm shop by appointment – call Mary on 017684 82742.

### Glenridding

*Glenridding Mini Market* (017684 82322) and *R&R The Corner Shop* (07928 792565) are located in the village and provide a range of provisions and souvenirs.

*Gifts are available from the Glenridding Gallery* (07928 792565), which is opposite the Glenridding Hotel.

*Catstycam Outdoor Shop* (017684 82351) offers an excellent range of outdoor gear and equipment, including walking boots, cagoules and jackets, fleeces and accessories. There is also a store in Pooley Bridge.

## Mobile Phones and Internet Access

There is limited reception for mobile phones in Patterdale – at the moment it's just Vodafone, and sometimes o2 and EE. If you subscribe to other networks, you can at least get away from things! You should be able to call from any mountain summit (seriously!) or from just beyond Glenridding as you travel towards Penrith (at Glencoyne Bay where the National Trust Car Park is).

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The cottage has Wifi – password is on the BT router and near the beginning of this guide. Most pubs, cafes and shops in the area have free wifi.

## Eating Out

There are a wide range of places to eat locally. We have listed the main ones below with a quick overview of what is available and whether they are pet friendly or not. Please note at busy times of the year it might be worth ringing and booking a table for evening meals.

<b>The Royal at Dockray</b>	Head north out of Glenridding along the lake road (A592) and turn left just before Aira Force to Dockray. The Hotel is just over the bridge on the left. 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<b>The Queens Head Troutbeck (Windermere)</b>	Elizabethan coaching Inn on the other side of Kirkstone just before you get into Windermere. <b>Kirkstone Pass Inn</b>	Worth a trip during the day for the views (assuming it's not misty!) Great location at the top of Kirkstone Pass with views down towards Windermere.	015394 33888	Yes

## Local Attractions

There are a host of places to see in the area and there should be leaflets for most things in the cottage. Here are a selection of our favourites.

### Ullswater Steamers

The Ullswater Steamers sail every day to Howtown and Pooley Bridge. An up-to-date timetable is provided in the back of this folder. You can take the boat to Howtown and then walk back to Patterdale and Glenridding (about 7 miles/11 km) – described by Wainwright as one of the best walks in the Lake District! Phone 017684 82229

**Glenridding Sailing School**, located on the opposite side of the beck to the Steamers, provides sailing, kayak and canoe tuition and boat hire. Ideal for messing about on the lake! Pete and the team are hugely knowledgeable and very friendly. If you've never been sailing then we recommend booking yourself in for a taster session. Open from Easter to the end of October. Phone 017684 82541

**St Patrick's Boathire**: just outside Glenridding on the way to Patterdale on the right. Rowing boats, kayak and motor boats can be hired. A great way to see the Lake and Jared and the team will make sure you're safe and in control before you set off! Phone 017684 82393.

**Aira Force**: National Trust Waterfall on the western side of Ullswater. Head north towards Penrith on the A592 and it's about 10 minutes drive from Glenridding. A nice circular woodland walk takes you to the waterfall itself – which is great at any time of the year but especially after heavy rain (so quite often!). There is also a good café.

**Fishing**: Mostly for Brown Trout (15th March to 30th September) and Perch (June to March). In Ullswater, Goldrill Beck and Brother's Water you do not require a permit, but a National Rivers Authority rod licence must be held, and can be purchased on a daily, weekly or annual basis from either the Pooley Bridge or Glenridding Tourist Information Centre

### Other Attractions worth a visit:

**Dalemmain House** - on the way to Penrith. Tours of the house you can also wander through the lovely gardens and eat in the old great hall. (Phone 017684 86450 Postcode CA11 OHB)

**Threlkeld Mining Museum** – quirky small attraction gives you the chance to go underground on a tour of the old mine workings as well as seeing some of the machinery once used. There is also an exhibition charting the mining activities throughout the lakes, including the Greenside mine in Glenridding up the road from the cottages. (Phone 01768 779747 Postcode CA12 4TT).

## Children's Activities

For children, there is a **small playground** at the bottom of Greenside Road on the left hand side. As well as the Steamers, Boats and Sailing listed above we also recommend the following Children's Activities in the area.

**Reach Beyond Adventure** - A great local outdoor adventure company offering a wide range of outdoor activities in and around Ullswater including canoeing, guided walking, ridge scrambling, climbing, ghyll scrambling, bushcraft, outdoor first aid training and more. Ideal for individuals, families & groups. Phone Sue on 01768 483867.

**Brockhole Visitor Centre in Windermere** has an array of things to keep children entertained including an outdoor play area, boat hire, archery and bike hire. In addition Tree Top Treks (zip wires) and Tree Top Nets are based on site. You can also walk down to the shores of Windermere and paddle in the lake and get the Steamer from the pier to tour the lake. There is a cafe and a small indoor play area. The centre runs additional activities in the holidays, so it is worth checking out their web site prior to visiting [www.brockhole.co.uk](http://www.brockhole.co.uk) (Phone 015394 46601 Postcode **LA23 1LJ**)

A trip to Windermere would not be complete without a visit to one of the many shrines to the great Beatrix Potter. We recommend the **World of Beatrix Potter Attraction** which is ideal for smaller children and has a good cafe. (Phone 015394 88444 Postcode: LA23 3BX)

**Whinlatter Forest Park** is the other side of Keswick off the A66. It has a fantastic play area for kids set in the forest. There is also the Whinlatter Go Ape for older children and adults. There are also a number of mountain bike trails through the woodland and you can hire mountain bikes and Sedgeways!. The centre has an excellent cafe (although it can get a little busy!) And you can even watch the Ospreys on Bassenthwaite via a video link. (Phone 01768 778469 - Postcode **CA12 5TW**)

**Rookin House Activity Centre** – Rookin House offers a range of activities from horse riding to quad bike trails to human bowling. It is essential to book in advance, particularly in the school holidays. (Phone 017684 83561 – e mail [enquiries@rookinhouse.co.uk](mailto:enquiries@rookinhouse.co.uk))

**Pony Trekking at Sockbridge** (at the Northern end of the Lake) Caters for all age groups and levels of ability; their rides are along pretty country lanes and fells overlooking Ullswater. (Phone 01768 863468).

There are also some good aquariums at Newby Bridge and Maryport.

## Local Walks

There are of course literally hundreds of walks in the area and there are plenty of maps and guides in the cottage and available at the TIC and all the local shops. Please make sure you're equipped with a OL5 Ordnance Survey Map (there's one in the cottage and if it's getting a little dog eared please let us know!) and also you have the right gear. In an emergency please call 999 and ask for Mountain Rescue, and of course please follow the country code – no littering, close all gates and respect the local wildlife! If you want a guide for your walks we recommend Steve from Glenridding (Phone 017684 82957).

To give you a flavour here is a summary of some of our favourite walks from the cottage....

### **Helvellyn – moderate to tough!**

The “must do” walk in the area! Our favourite ascent is actually via the Grisedale Valley to Hole in the Wall, along Striding Edge to the Summit, back down via Swirral Edge to Red Tarn, and then back down via Greenside back to Glenridding. To get to the Grisedale Valley you can do the “Stepping Stones Walk” (see below) or go past the Church and turn left by the playing field and follow the signs. A word of caution – the weather can close in very rapidly and it can be very windy and slippery on the top – especially on Striding Edge. Our rule of thumb is generally if you can't see the summit because of the cloud then it's probably not worth going all the way! Red Tarn is a great destination in its own right. Also note that on Striding Edge there is a path on the north side of the ridge which switches to the south side just before the chimney – worth bearing in mind if you don't fancy the ridge itself!

### **Place Fell – moderate!**

Our local fell and also generally quieter than Helvellyn but offering some superb views across the valley of Ullswater and across to Helvellyn. The easiest ascent is via Patterdale. Head over Goldrill Bridge (40 yards up the road on the right). Follow the road to the end and veer left and head up onto the fell through the gate on the right. Take either of the right hand paths to Boredale Hause and then veer left and follow the new path to the summit. There is one slight scramble chimney which can be avoided towards the top by taking the path to the left. Once you reach the summit keep going to the cairn – it's great up there and there are plenty of water pool and peat bogs to wallow in if you're a dog! You can then either descend the way you came up, or keep heading north and drop down via Howtown. For a more rapid and exciting descent try coming down Kilbert How to the Lake shore. This is the route of the annual Boundary Walk we do and also makes for a more direct uphill ascent if you're in the mood. This path starts/end just before Silver Point.

### **Angle Tarn - moderate**

Another favourite of ours – a magical place at all times of the year. Again head from Patterdale up to Boredale Hause but bear off to the right and either take the “low” path or go up and over Angle Tarn Pikes to Angle Tarn itself. When you're at Boredale Hause it's worth taking 10 minutes to go straight ahead and take in the view down into Martindale below High Street. In the autumn you'll see the Red Deer herd and in October you'll probably hear and see the Stags in full rut mode!

### **Stepping Stones in Glenamarra (fairly easy)**

A good morning wake up walk from the cottage for you and the dog! Head left out of the cottage, and just before the post office turn left and follow the path up behind the loos. Keep going and then

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go through the gate up onto the fell. Follow the path straight up and go through the gate. The path to the left here takes you up Arnison Crag if you are in need of elevation. If not head into Glenamara Park, follow the path and you'll come to the Stepping Stones over the beck. Keep going on the path and you'll get to another gate on the right. You can either drop down onto the road from here and come back to Patterdale, or keep going to the left (not straight up as that will take you to St Sunday Crag which is bit much for early in the morning!). Follow the side of the wall through the pine forest and you'll reach another gate. Go through this and follow the wall and you'll see Grisedale Valley on your right. Go through the first gate on the right you come to and drop down to the valley floor. Then turn right and head back down the road to Patterdale. Morgan's favourite morning walk!

## **Howtown to Patterdale**

The classic walk. Take the Steamer from Glenridding to Howtown Pier and then walk back along the Lake Shore to Patterdale. It's about 7 miles or so walking on the way back and it's not all gentle lakeside strolling with a fair bit of ups and downs but a great walk nonetheless and one for all the family (we first took our son when he was 3!). You can also do the reverse walk of course from Patterdale to Howtown.

We have loads of other favourites of course so if you want some inspiration let us know!

## **Walking With Dogs in the Dale**

One of the joys of this part of the country is that it is ideal for walking dogs off the lead. However there are many temptations so please make sure your dog is under control at all times and especially during the run up to and during the course of the lambing season which runs from March to May. You should also make sure your dog is on the lead whenever you're in a field with sheep in. Also watch out for the cows, especially in Glenamarra Park (behind us in Patterdale) between Easter and September. We've found the trick with cows and dogs is to let the dog off the lead, walk through the cows yourself and then call the dog. Whatever you do don't run but feel free to make plenty of noise and wave your arms if the cows start following you (as they have a habit of doing!)

The nearest train stations are Penrith (North) and Windermere (South). For train times please call the National Rail Enquiries Line on 08457 48 49 50. On the buses, Stagecoach runs the 108 service from Penrith to Glenridding and Patterdale. There is also a 517 service from Ambleside to Patterdale and Glenridding operating in the summer. For further details call Traveline on 0870-608-2608. The nearest bus stop is just along from the Patterdale Hotel (towards Glenridding) and on the opposite side of the road in the carpark.
